Tenure-track Instructor Position in Counselling Psychology

The Department of Educational and Counselling Psychology, and Special Education (ECPS) in the Faculty of Education at the University of British Columbia invites applications for a **tenure-track Instructor position in Counselling Psychology**.

Applicants must have a doctoral degree in Counselling Psychology from a CPA or APA accredited program, and must be eligible for registration with the College of Psychologists of British Columbia. If not already registered, the successful candidate is expected to initiate the registration process by the start date of this appointment or shortly thereafter. Evidence of scholarly achievement, demonstrated excellence in teaching and clinical supervision, and a commitment to curriculum development and educational leadership are required. Evidence of educational leadership activities includes teaching mentorship, curriculum development and planning, active engagement in the scholarship of teaching and learning, organization of conferences and educational events, and/or contributions to the theory and practice of teaching and learning. Preference will be given to individuals with outstanding teaching (preferably at the graduate level) and clinical supervisory experience, a commitment to working individually and collaboratively to enhance teaching and learning within the Counselling Psychology Masters and Doctoral programs, and the ability to successfully contribute to teaching in one or more of the other ECPS programs. The successful applicant is expected to teach a range of clinical and theoretical courses at both the Masters and Doctoral levels, to provide clinical supervision and mentorship of Masters and Doctoral students in Counselling Psychology, to engage in educational leadership initiatives and activities that serve to forward the mission of the Counselling Psychology program and to participate, as a faculty member, in the academic and professional activities in the Department and the Faculty. The annual workload for a tenure-stream Instructor is 24 credits. **The position is expected to commence July 1, 2018 (or as negotiated with the successful candidate).**

Our areas of focus include school, higher education, community and agency, and vocational rehabilitation counselling. We adhere to a scientist-practitioner training model. Graduate training at UBC is distinguished in its strong appreciation for diversity, in terms of the populations served, the students recruited and admitted, the issues and elements of the practice examined and trained, and the provision of skills and experiences in working with a broad range of individuals, couples and families.

This is a tenure-track position in the Educational Leadership Stream and the successful candidate will be reviewed for reappointment, tenure, and promotion in subsequent years in accordance with the Collective Agreement. It is expected that Instructors will keep abreast of current literature and developments in Counselling Psychology, and in the field of teaching and learning.

Applicants are asked to send a cover letter, current curriculum vitae, a statement of instructional and clinical interests, evidence of teaching effectiveness in a wide range of both clinical and theoretical courses. Applications must be provided in the format of one bookmarked PDF file. Applicants should also provide the names of three referees together with their addresses, phone numbers, and email addresses.
